Conservatory reopened to members Feb. 28 [from a BBG Garden Dirt report]

The Conservatory at Birmingham Botanical Gardens has been closed to the public since April of 2011 due to safety concerns. Following a \$1.3 million upgrade in 2013, it's now being given new life, and the iconic Birmingham landmark is preparing to open its doors once again as both an attraction and a classroom.

On Sunday, February 23, members, donors and media were invited to tour the 50-year-old facility. From noon - 4 p.m., refreshments were served as Executive Director & CEO Fred Spicer, Director of Education Henry Hughes, and Volunteer Coordinator Taylor Steele showed off improvements made. On the following Monday, the Conservatory opened to the public for the first time in nearly three years.



This free annual event this year brings noted botanist David Price to BBG for an intriguing talk on "A Sense of Place: Bok Tower Gardens." Price recently co-authored *Bok Tower Gardens—America's Taj Mahal*, published by Rizzoli Press.

As Bok Tower Gardens (in Lake Wales, Florida, situated between Tampa and Orlando) celebrates its 85th anniversary, this Olmsted-designed garden and National Historic Landmark looks to its past and present to vision the future. Sited on Lake Wales Ridge, the Garden is surrounded by rolling hills of citrus, expanses of nature preserves, and some of the rarest plant habitat in North America.

Price, who is president of the Bok Tower Foundation, will talk on ongoing historic preservation efforts as well as the Gardens' rare plant conservation program.

The Spencer Lecture Series is made possible by the Virginia Beeland Spencer Lecture Fund at the Community Foundation of Greater Birmingham. The fund was started by the late William M. Spencer III in honor of his wife, the late Virginia Beeland Spencer.
